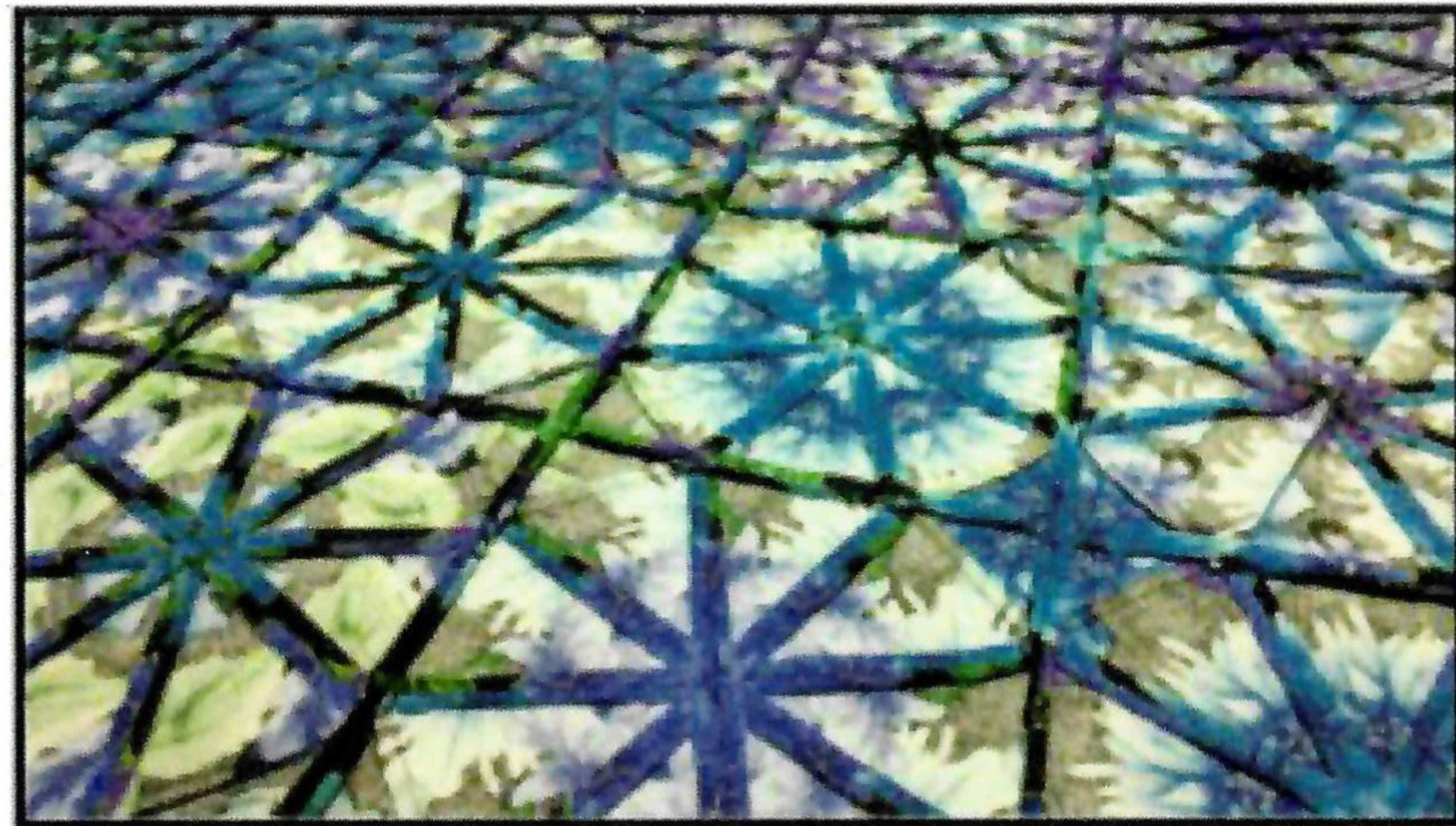


Kaleidoscope Within

- * Pre-cut Kaleidoscope Blocks, this quilt uses 20 - 7" Blocks
- * First Border & Binding 3/4 Yd
- * Second Border - 2/3 Yard

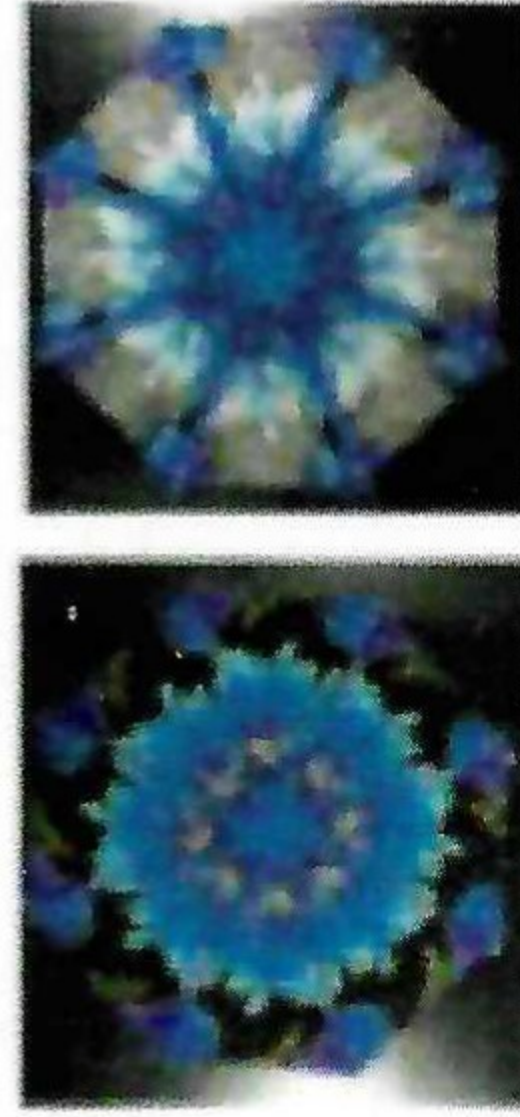

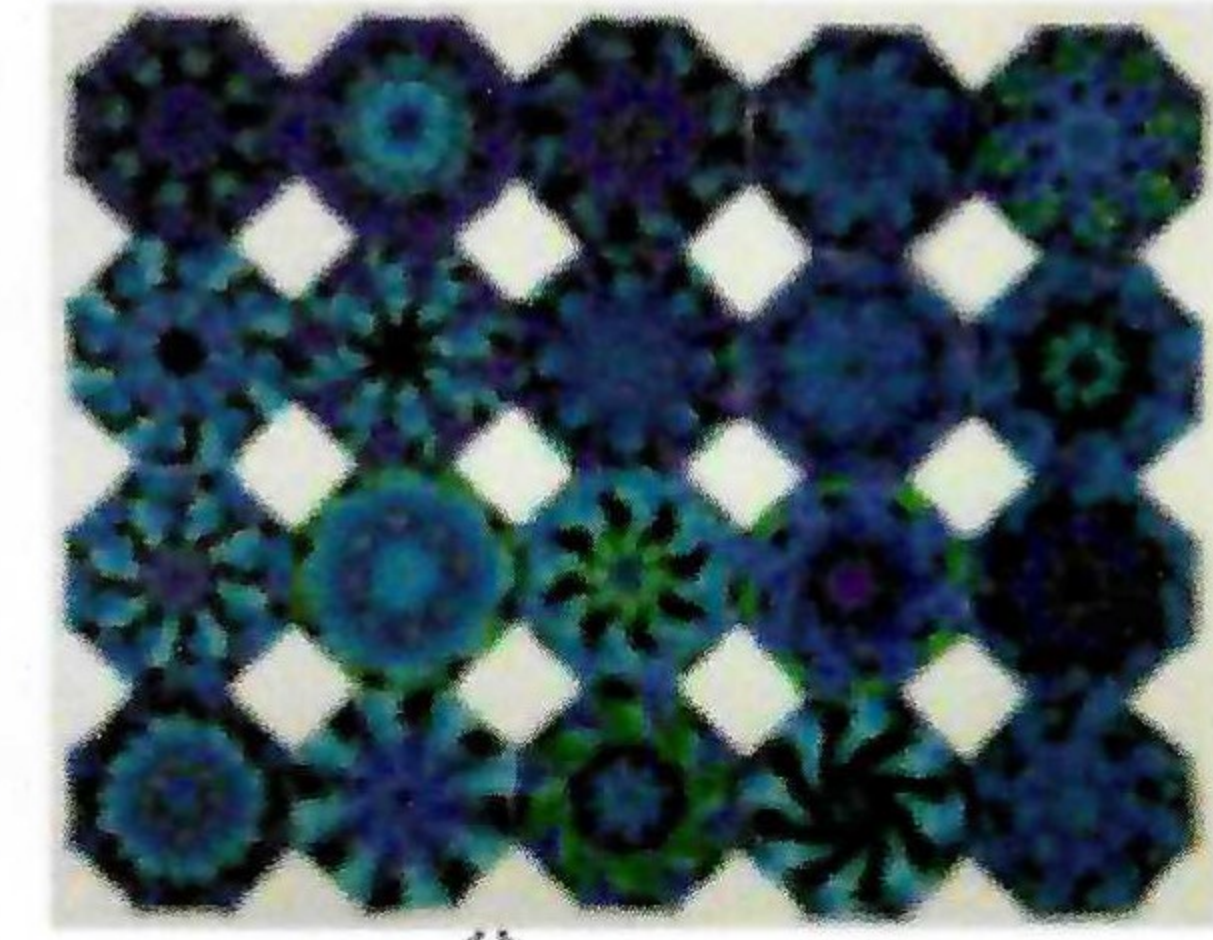

PLEASE READ DIRECTIONS THOROUGHLY BEFORE BEGINNING YOUR QUILT



Step 1 - Using a scant 1/4" seam allowance, sew all twenty blocks, press seams open and do not sew on corners yet. (Fig. 1)



Step 2 - Place your completed blocks on a design wall, table or floor and arrange until pleasing to your eye, everyone will do this step differently as we all have our own design likings. I grouped my blocks by color, all the purples next to each other etc. It is normal to change your blocks arounda numerous times before you get a design you like, most of all have fun with this step!! (See Fig. 2)

Step 3 - Keeping your blocks in order, spread them apart a couple inches, and then using the smaller corner blocks, place in the corner areas making another kaleidoscope block within the larger blocks, try and match colors so the quilt has a flowing feeling. Fill in all inner corner areas first, then do the outer edges (See Fig 3 & 4). You can see from photo that on the outer edges, you will only have 2 corners by each block, and finally the last set of four corners you have, you will place one in each corner.

Step 4 - Adding corners to your blocks - Take the first block from the upper left corner, and the four surrounding corners (all corners should be different See Fig. 4). It is very important to keep corners in the right place, I flip my corners over and pin the block while still on my design wall, this will save a lot of 'unsewing' and frustration!! Sew corners on, again using your scant 1/4", then square to 7.5", return block to the spot you took it from, repeat with all remaining blocks.

Step 5 - When finished sewing all blocks, you will have 5 rows of 4 blocks, sew each row together, again using your scant 1/4" seam allowance, then sew rows together. (See Fig 5 below).

Step 6 - Add Borders, for first border, cut 4 strips at 2.5", cording top and bottom borders, then side borders. For outer border, cut 5 strips at 4", again sewing top and bottom borders first, then adding side borders. Quilt as desired and bind.....

A few variations of no borders / borders below...

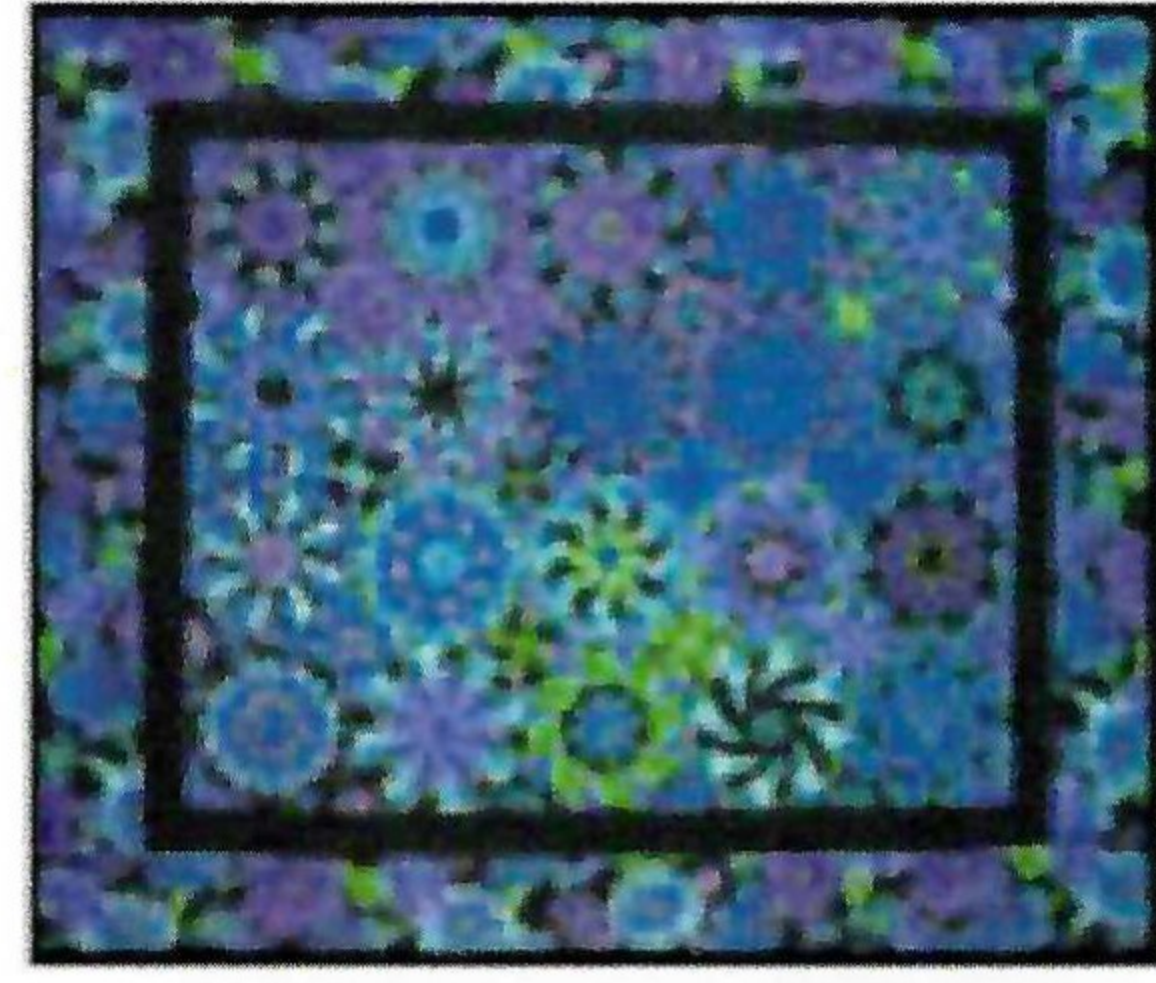
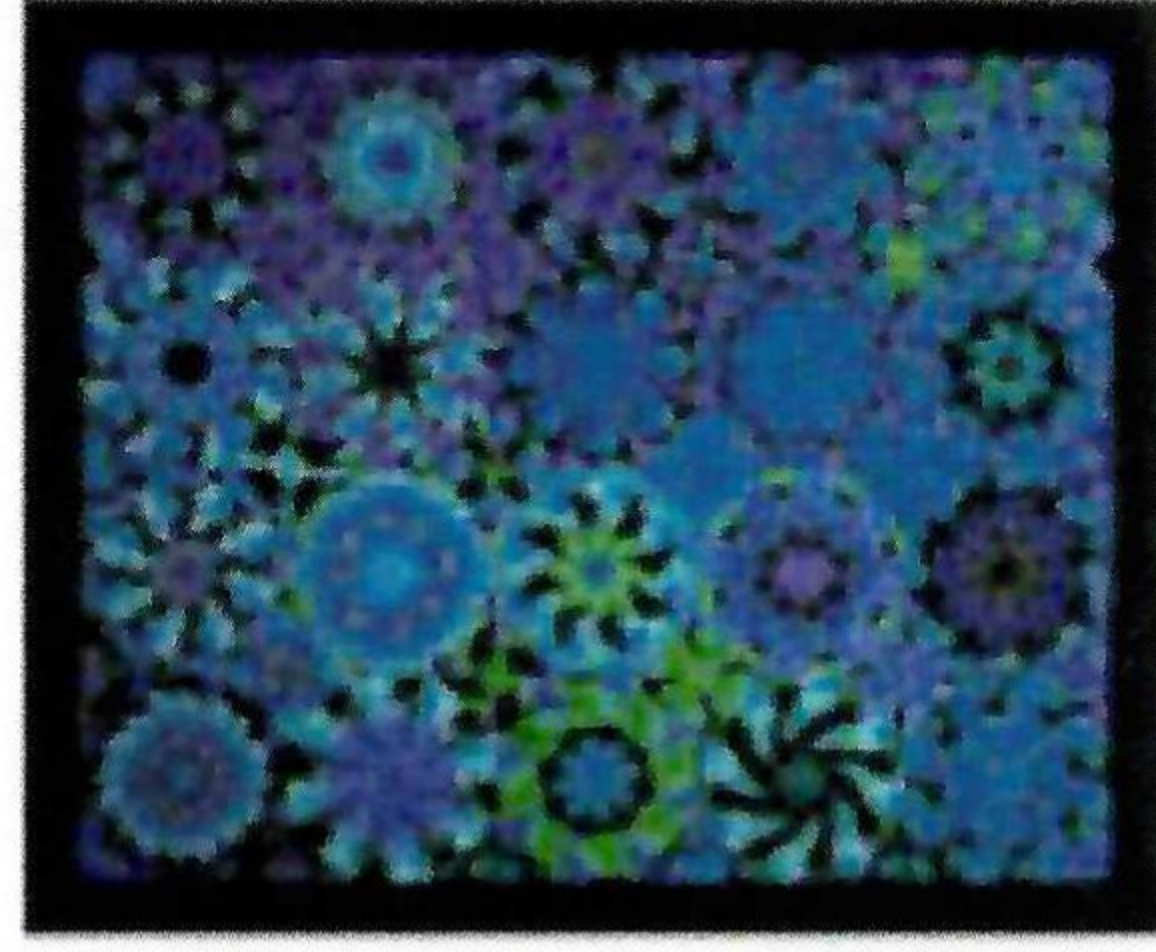
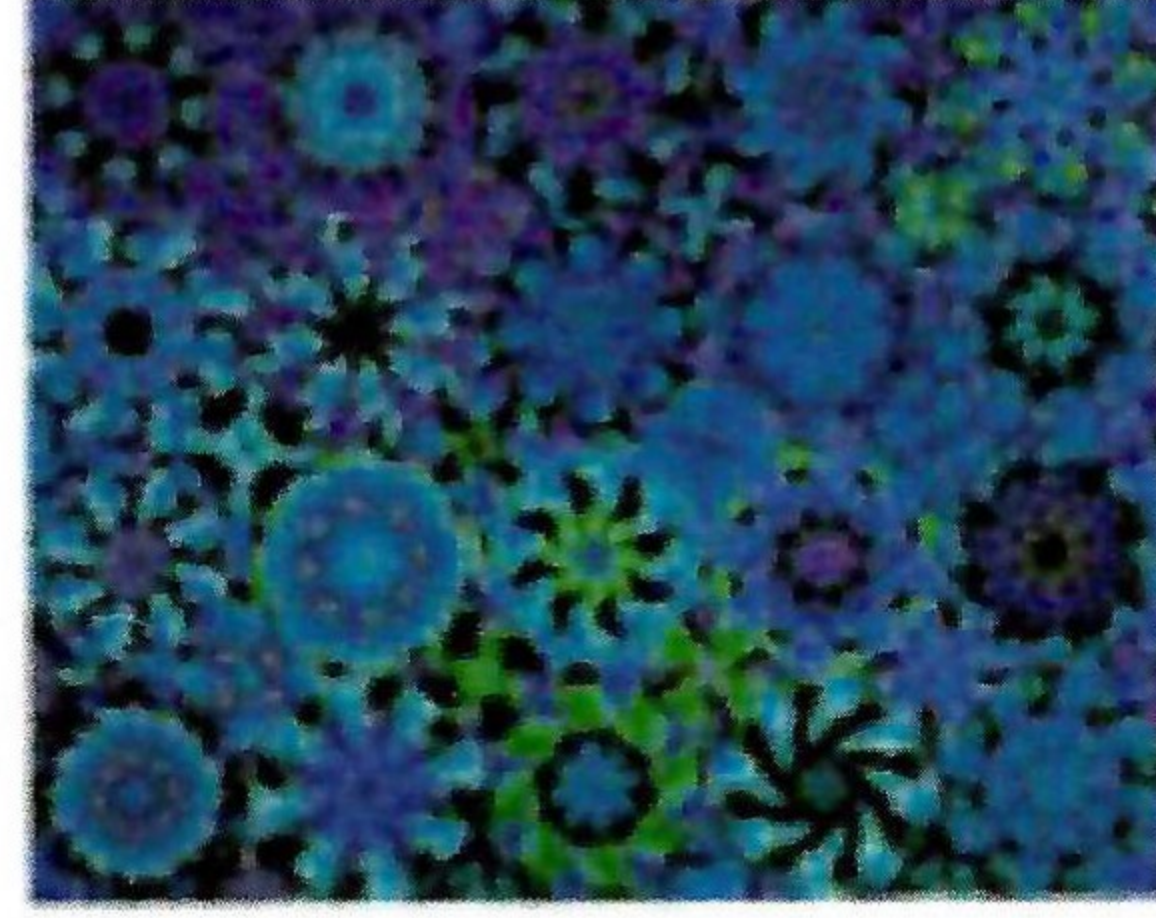

Side Note: We find using a scant 1/4" seam allowance gives a really nice finished block, one that lays flat and has a little extra 'wiggle room' when squaring up. If you do not use a scant 1/4", you may have to square to 7.25", which will give you a 6.75" finished block. We know everyone's sewing practices and machines are a little different, don't be afraid of tweaking the finished size by a 1/4" if necessary.
